The Church Board

From the board's perspective, 2007 would most appropriately be described as the year of planning, dreaming and excitement. This wonderful congregation supported a text book approach to redefining ourselves and now we stand on the edge of achieving beyond text book results. The board of Mantua Center Christian Church started the year by establishing key deliverables for each committee along with a list of things we hoped to accomplish as a group for 2007.

Those items were:

1. Clearly articulated congregational Statement of Calling & Ministry Plan.
2. Attract more people to help those who are working so hard to keep the church functioning.
3. Be more attentive to our elders and sick that are no longer able to get to church.
4. Establish a good, solid beginning process for how to search for a permanent minister.
5. 80% participation or better in the process of developing a mission/vision for the church.
6. Average Sunday attendance of 85. (We averaged 91 throughout 2007)
7. Receipts matching budgeted needs. (Receipts exceeded budgeted needs!)
8. Increase church membership at least 5 new members. (We added 17 new members in 2007)
9. Establish viable church web site.
10. Meet purchase goal for Chalice Hymnal.
11. Comprehensive survey of congregation, to ensure credibility of our Statement of Calling.
12. Clearly articulate what kind of pastor we need to realize our vision.
13. Increase congregational participation in church governance, evidenced by more members willing to serve on committees and leadership positions.
14. Maintain or grow church attendance by 5% net.
15. Work toward hiring a pastor for sometime in 2008. A good people person
16. Continue healing post Roger Mize
17. Set the stage for new ministries while continuing to support the established ones

I leave the quality of performance on these items up to each individual within the congregation. It is very rewarding to look back on a year and see the results of the power of great people practicing the teachings of Jesus Christ.

The Church Board - continued

The three most notable accomplishments of the Minister, the leadership and the congregation of Mantua Center Christian Church from my perspective were:

- The continued healing and excitement generated by Houston who is expertly serving his role as interim minister. There is varied speculation on his ability to perform at the same high level as a member of the congregation, but we will just have to wait and see if he can pull it off...
- The development of a Ministry Plan, Statement of Calling, Congregational Profile in preparation for kicking off a pastoral search. The development of the Go Fourth team to lead the minister search. And the patience of the congregation through completing multiple "fun and exciting" surveys...
- The establishment and progress of many new outreach initiatives along with the growth of many existing outreach activities. The development of SMILE, Loaves & Fishes across the World (I made up that name), Ellie's quilt mission, the youth New Orleans mission trip and the birth of the Adult New Orleans trip were each sparked by a member of the congregation with a passion and then embraced by other congregants excited about helping to put God's word into action. The phenomenal work of OWM who quietly went about earning and then donating over \$6,000 to fuel outreach initiatives in the community. Finally the growth of Shadow Woodstock to 800 participants and giving \$100,000 to thirteen new charitable initiatives. All of this for a little farm church on the outskirts of nowhere...☺

Now the torch of board leadership passes to the capable hands of Brian Hurd who is a great match for the needs of our ministry plan. Yes. OUR MINISTRY PLAN I would like to thank each and every person who struggled, supported, gave, forgave, hurt, rejoiced, sweated, laughed, studied, challenged, changed and most of all, LOVED throughout the year in the name of Jesus Christ and Mantua Center Christian Church.

Library

The library has added a new line of books this year; resource aides for elders and leaders of worship that are contained on a separate shelf marked **WORSHIP**. As more of these types of books become available, they will be added. A thank you to Houston and others who help choose these books.

After our Good Friday prayer vigil last year, several persons mentioned books that were available for reading during the vigil. Several of these books have been added to the library: Living by the Word, (Meditations from The Christian Century), Between Two Gardens (From Eden to Gethsemane), by Jane Rubietta and Sources of Strength by Jimmy Carter. The Westminster Collection of Christian Meditations containing meditations by many persons familiar to us was added to our collection.

Steve Hurd presented the library with a copy of American Gospel by Jon Meacham. Our presidents and the religion they practiced and the affect this had on their presidencies.

Added to the youth library were: Bridge to Terabithia by Katherine Paterson, Tears of a Tiger by Sharon M. Draper, The Boy Who Saved Baseball by John H. Ritter, Nothing But the Truth and Blue Heron both by Avi, Eragon by Christopher Paolini, The Sea of Trolls by Nancy Farmer, Artemis Fowl (The Lost Colony), by Eoin Colfer, and The Giver by Lois Lowry. In the adult library, but for young adults also is A Northern Light by Jennifer Donnelly. This book won the Prinz Award for young adults. Most of the books mentioned above have been awarded the Newbery Award, or the Newbery Honor Award.

Some books are in the Adult room upstairs; include The Secret Life of Bees and When the Heart Waits by Sue Monk Kidd, Heaven, Editor Roger Ferlo, a collection of meditations about heaven, and The Door Within by Wayne Thomas Batson.

Where God Was Born by Bruce Feiler; the author describes the lands where religion began, or as the author says where God was born.

We continue to plead for books to be returned so others may enjoy them. The Boy Who Saved Baseball and Walk Two Moons were not signed out but have been taken. Other books are just very, very late.

- In June, we bid a sad farewell to the Weldy family as they moved to the Toledo area for David's new position on the faculty of the Medical College of Ohio. We were truly blessed to have David, Ann, Steve, John, and Christina as part of our congregation for so many years. Not only did the entire family graciously share their many talents at MCCC, but they were also involved with the community in so many ways. We said good-bye after worship with a few tokens of our appreciation - a memory book signed by members of the congregation, photos of Mantua Center, and a Chalice Hymnal. They are greatly missed . . .
- In July, Tom Gerez organized our annual golf outing on a beautiful Sunday afternoon. A good time was had by the 10 players that took part, but no one was willing to share stories about their exploits on the links. Apparently it's like being in Las Vegas - whatever happens on the golf course, stays on the golf course.
- In September, the Alger family again hosted the Baseball with the Babes game. Over 80 people enjoyed a sunny fall day with a picnic and great fellowship. The Babes and their families say they enjoy playing in this game every fall - we're not sure if it's because of the good food, the good fellowship, or because they tend to beat the church team each year.
- The Derthick's hosted another great Hayride this year, with the added attraction of the corn maze. It was a big crowd, a beautiful October evening under the stars, and everyone had a great time.

Outreach

During 2007, special offering campaigns were held for Easter, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and the Week of Compassion. Total contributions from the congregation were \$3,098.

A highlight of the year was a visit by Week of Compassion Associate Director Amy Gopp, who conducted a worship service followed by a special presentation on the work of Week of Compassion. Her enthusiasm was an inspiration to all who attended, and helped us to better understand the importance of our contributions.

OWM (Ohio Women's Ministries)

As always we have had a busy year. Although we don't have regular meetings we seem to continue to get everything done. Most of all we are able to support all the different charity goals we have. This year we have helped where needed as the year went along instead of waiting for December to give to the different groups. The year started off with the donation to Crestwood Schools and the purchase of flags to warn drivers that there were children waiting for a bus. We donated to the UN Seminar, the first New Orleans mission trip our young people took, (we also contributed toward the second mission trip 24 adults will take in Feb.), to the Cann Converse Scholarship Fund, and to Shadow Woodstock, Megan Brant Scholarship Fund. Ellie Monroe (and a few helpers) spent many hours sorting through the donated items for the Rummage Sale in July. It seems to be a lot of work and maybe not enough profit for the work involved. We have tried changing the time of year that we do this and so far there hasn't been as much success as we would like. We'll need to take another look at this project to see if we will continue to have it.

This year Pat Magyarics decided that it was time for someone else to take over the Funeral dinners that we prepare for our families during this hard time. Standing in the wings to take over was Sue Wright, who knew that this was the job for her. We are so blessed, first by Pat, a job more than well done and now by Sue, who will lead us well I am sure.

Shadow Woodstock and the Christmas Bazaar both take a lot of time, baking, making of soup and working the booths. We continue to be Blessed, in that our ladies do us proud with the food and working these long days. Thanks to Joan Simans' efforts we have new aprons to wear that show that we are OWM and that we are from MCCC. We will wear these proudly and do a little advertising as well. At the end of the year it was time to elect a new leader. This year Jaimy Brown stepped up and was accepted by all as the leader for next year.

Trustees Report

Not all of our original goals for 2007 have been accomplished. These were the first three items on the following list:

- The light for the south parking lot has been removed from its old location, but it has not yet been reinstalled.
- The old children's classroom has been refurbished, new electrical outlets were installed and a freezer is now in place.
- The men's restroom in the sanctuary building has been refurbished. A small water heater was installed and hot water is now available there and in the adjoining women's restroom.
- Two new garage door openers were installed in the parsonage.
- A water filter for drinking water was installed in the parsonage.
- Ravenna Pest Control performed two inspections and follow-up activity to eliminate some rodents and bees.
- A key box was constructed and installed in the utility closet.
- An overhead light was repaired at the parsonage.
- An exhaust fan was installed in the kitchen.
- The timer controlling the outside lights on the education building was replaced with an electronic unit that will automatically adjust for DST and seasonal changes.

Worship Committee

Our year was another busy and meaningful year for the worship committee and the congregation of Mantua Center. We continued to include worship leaders as part of our regular Sunday morning worship. Special music during the summer months took place while the choir had some time off.

In February the Four Chaplains ceremony was part of our morning worship service. We had 125 in attendance. Our Lenten study kicked off at the end of February and was well attended for the six sessions. The study utilized the movie "Chocolat". Several of the participants also took turns leading a session.

Holy Week included the Maundy Thursday service held at Hilltop Church with CYF United in charge of the service. A Good Friday prayer vigil was held at The Center allowing time for meaningful meditation and prayer from 6am to 6pm. Our Sunrise Service included a skit performed by Houston Bowers, Rick and Peggy Painley. A continental breakfast followed which was prepared by the Education department and served by our Chi Rho. A traditional Easter service concluded our Holy Week.

On the 27th of May we held our worship service at Buchert Park in Mantua. We participated in a washing of hands ceremony and witnessed thirteen baptisms in the river that day. We shared in a picnic lunch following the services.

This year we were able to conclude our project to acquire Chalice Hymnals for worship. Nancy Humes headed the project and we ordered and received 100 hymnals. Ellie Monroe did all the calligraphy on the bookplates for the hymnals.

The candelabras were refinished this year giving them a much needed "face lift". We also through the assistance of memorial funds from the Hammel family purchased all new oil-filled candles for the candelabras and communion table candles. No more wax dripping all over the candelabras!

Our Advent season theme centered on Gifts and each week as part of the Children's Moment, they lit the Advent candles. Christmas Eve service revealed the greatest gift of all - the opening of the biggest box to find Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus. Leanne Painley and Parker Schabel did a wonderful job as Mary and Joseph.

Youth Report

Our large Chi Rho group stayed active in fun and service activities. They continued to provide help to congregants by doing yard work, cleaning, moving things or whatever else needed to be done. They also cleaned the church and set up for Loaves & Fishes meals, and prepared food for the annual Easter Sunrise breakfast.

The kids participated in a district rally and overnight at the Alliance Christian Church with over 70 of their friends from camp! They also combined with the Chi Rho kids from Hiram and Hilltop in a "fun night" at Hiram, and a Crop Walk in the fall.

We sent 9 Chi Rhoers to Camp Christian with 2 adult counselors (Stephen Alger, Paige Collins, Alison Hurd, Alex Hurd, Philip Hurd, Lauren Painley, Sam Roubic, Alyssa Schabel, Connor Schabel, Brian Hurd & Rick Painley).

Another highlight was the annual WhirlyBall trip followed by a lock-in at the church. A great time was had by all. (Mrs. Magyarics is really funny after 3am!).

Teacher/leader Carol Magyarics, helped by Lauren Welch and others, kept this active group going.

The High School youth had a wonderful year as well. The beginning of the year focused on planning and fundraising for a mission trip to Louisiana. The CYF United raised funds at the Kiwanas Spaghetti dinner, and a "Night in New Orleans" dinner with Cajun food and live music. In June, 13 youth and 5 adults from the 3 churches joined several other youth and adults from two other churches for our big trip! Our caravan found its way to deep in the Bayou, where we stayed at a Lutheran Social Services facility. Four work crews hung drywall, mudded, painted, put down flooring and did electrical and plumbing work. It was an extremely rewarding experience for us all as we built skills, and more importantly built an understanding of the joy of serving others. Our evening devotions and closing worship service helped us to bring into focus the connections we made: connections with the people of the Bayou, connections with each other, and connections with living out our faith. We were able to share our experiences with the 3 churches and community groups who gave us financial support, building excitement that resulted in an adult group planning a mission trip to New Orleans in 2008. Participants from Mantua Center were: Tom and Jared Gerez, Brian and Dan Hurd, Rick and Leanne Painley and Trica Fox.

Several youth and adults attended the State CYF convention in March at Bethany College. As always we sent kids to CYF conference for a special week of fellowship and spiritual growth. In June we honored seniors Dan Hurd & Becky Bennett with a timeline of their lives so far and into the future.

Fun activities included a picnic, a Whirlyball trip and a lock-in.

We participated in the Crop walk and installed a wheelchair ramp, painted and did yard work for an elderly Hiram church congregant.

Special Youth Sundays included a service where the kids related skits and songs from their camp experience.
